










Why be a Rotarian?



7 Habits of Effective Rotarians The idea for this article comes from Steven Covey's popular book entitled, "The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People." Mr. Covey's research found that highly effective and thus successful people who made an impact in their various fields shared a specific set of character traits and habits. Over the past 10 years, leaders have written on the habits of effective Rotarians. This version is driven and adapted by some great work. Vibrant Rotary clubs are driven by effective people.

Let's look at the key habits.

- 1. PARTICIPATION: Effective Rotarians are engaged with a priority to attend club meetings and complete timely make ups. They are active on committees, fundraising and service projects. They are keen to attend all club events and district functions and even the Rotary International Convention.
- 2. FELLOWSHIP: Effective Rotarians enjoy and value their relationships and know that fellowship is a key to the value of Rotary. They go out of their way to talk to those whom they do not know and believe a stranger is just a friend they have not met yet.
- 3. VOCATION: Effective Rotarians respect every vocation. They firmly believe that each vocation provides a cog in the wheel and is important. They advocate living Rotary values and the Four Way Test in the workplace as part of excellence in each vocation.
- 4. DISCIPLINE: Effective Rotarians understand the value of self-discipline and know that productive accomplishments are hard to achieve without it.
- 5. WORK, WEALTH AND WISDOM: Effective Rotarians are purpose-driven in Rotary and contribute to success and impact with their resources. They are effective with the proper balance between their family, vocation and community.
- 6. EMPATHY/SERVICE: Effective Rotarians care deeply about helping others and seek to make a difference.
- 7. IMAGE OF ROTARY: Effective Rotarians know they are an important part of the great Rotary brand. They maintain a positive attitude and portray a good image of Rotary, both inside and outside the organization. They proudly wear their Rotary pin and clothing. Effective Rotarians share their passion and pride with others. They tell their personal Rotary story. In so doing, they invite others to meetings and service projects to help grow Rotary, enhance impact and share the rewards of Service Above Self. A Look back at the 20 Years

Our year has seen a number of disasters, and while these were certainly not welcomed by our club, it has been inspiring to be in a position to help so many other people. Much of our assistance has been of the cash kind, as that is what the circumstances required.

Notably we were quick to support the Japanese victims of the earth quake and tsunami that caused so much death and destruction. Our club made an immediate donation at a district level to go direct to the Rotary district in Japan that was most affected.

At present there is a representative of Rotary in Thailand in Japan, and we look forward to seeing the report on how our assistance supported the Japanese people in their hour of need.



Closer to home there have been two disasters that we were able to help with, a slum fire in Patong and a flooding and landslide situation in Krabi.

A fire in Patong left a number of low income earners homeless, and without any possessions.

Many of those affected were of Burmese origin and so did not qualify for any government assistance.

Our club promptly allocated a large amount of money to support these people and we were able to supply bedding, kitchen utensils and other items which allowed these people to get back on with their lives.

The flooding in Krabi and subsequent landslides killed a number of people and left even more homeless. Our club donated immediately from our cash reserves and also participated in a very successful street collection in Patong, along with other Phuket Rotary Clubs.

In other areas, we were able to work in a more community development kind of way, rather than a disaster response situation.

Through the efforts of our travelling Rotarians Rick and Anne, we have been able to amass a large amount of English language books from the USA, that have been donated to the Phuket Library.

These will be of use to both English speaking expats and Thai people wanting to improve their English language skills. It is anticipated that this project will continue into future years.

We had a very successful Kid's Day at the Phuket Special School in Pakhlok. These often over looked children got to watch a lot of expat and Thai adults play a range of sports, join in a bunch of fun games and watch a magic show. The adults enjoyed themselves and the lunch. It is assumed the kids had a good time too.

The club, in conjunction with the US Navy League worked on a number of Comrels throughout Phuket and beyond. These Comrels (Community Relations activities) are opportunities for visiting US navy service people to work on local community programs. Our club members organized, liaised, financially supported and participated in many projects with both navy personnel, other local people and the Phuket US Navy League.





Our main fundraising event of the year was a golf day and charity auction. Held at Laguna, the event was a great success, and contributed significantly to the financial well-being of the club.







Other activities and milestones in the year are:

- Continued support of the Home and Life Foundation in Phang Nga (orphanage and disadvantaged kids);
- As required support for the Life Home Project at Koh Sirey (women and children with AIDS);
- Continued support of over 200 children on the Tsunami Scholarship Program, which now includes both tsunami affected and other disadvantaged children.
- Support for the mother and children of a Thai lady who was murdered in Phuket.
 These two children concerned are now on the above scholarship program.
- We now have a Hill Tribe student being supported through university, where he hopes to acquire a degree in engineering that will help him provide development assistance to his village.
- We have begun work on a water filter project, in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Saint Moritz, and hope to be able to assist a number of remote and disadvantaged communities obtain clean drinking water.
- Assistance continues to be provided to a sea gypsy village (Moken people), where our club is assisting with water and other facilities.

There are more projects, no doubt some are over looked here. My apologies for the oversight, there is so much that our club does in one year, that it is hard to keep track of all of it.

With the exception of Rick and Anne, who stand out in their efforts on our behalf in the USA, I have refrained from mentioning Rotarians by name. We are a team, and what each of us does is a part of the whole. I thank the team, particularly the board members who have helped me so ably, for all that we achieved in a very successful year.

PART 9

More Rotary Firsts .

- Rotary established the "Endowment Fund" in 1917, which became the forerunner of The Rotary Foundation.
- Rotary first adopted the name "Rotary International" in 1922 when the name was changed from the International Association of Rotary Clubs.
- Rotary first established the Paul Harris Fellows recognition in 1957 for contributors of US\$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation.
- The Rotary emblem was printed on a commemorative stamp for the first time in 1931 at the time of the Vienna Convention.
- The first Rotary club banner (from the Houston Space Centre) to orbit the moon was carried by astronaut Frank Borman, a member of that club.
- The first Rotary International convention held outside the United States was in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1921.
- The first head of state to address a Rotary convention was U.S. President Warren G. Harding in 1923 at St. Louis. Room 711 Rotary's Birthplace The number 711 has a very special significance for Rotary. Room 711 of the old Unity Building, formerly located at 127 North Dearborn Street in downtown Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A., was the birthplace of Rotary International. That historic room, which was the office of engineer Gus Loehr, was the location of that first meeting when Paul Harris met with several friends to discuss his new idea of a club for professionals and businessmen.

Room 711 - Rotary's Birthplace The number 711 has a very special significance for Rotary. Room 711 of the old Unity Building, formerly located at 127 North Dearborn Street in downtown Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A., was the birthplace of Rotary International. That historic room, which was the office of engineer Gus Loehr, was the location of that first meeting when Paul Harris met with several friends to discuss his new idea of a club for professionals and businessmen.

It took extensive research and dedication by a few Chicago Rotarians to preserve the room and restore it to its 1905 authenticity. For years, Room 711 was preserved as a miniature Rotary museum by Rotarians around the world who voluntarily belonged to and contributed annually to the "Paul Harris 711 Club," which provided funds for leasing, maintenance and preservation. In 1989, the Unity Building was about to be torn down. Members of the 711 Club carefully dismantled the landmark room and placed its contents in storage. There it stayed until 1994, when the recreated Room 711 found a permanent home, and this piece of the Rotary heritage is preserved at the RI World Headquarters in Evanston.


SECOND TEXT MESSAGE:









